PRESIDENTS REPORT



The start of 2024 was heralded by a significant amount of personnel change. We said farewell to our GM David after 5 years in charge and were very pleased to be able to appoint an internal candidate in Luke to that role. At the same time we had 3 new leadership appointments to the team spanning operations, finance, competitive programs and front of office. Welcome to Cathy, Oscar, Paul and all the other new joiners.

Due to such immense change, we took the opportunity to review and refine our operations, roles and programs with a view to ensuring we can deliver on our promises and values to our members. For this reason we made the difficult decision to discontinue our tumble program and satellites, while at the same time optimising our competitive pathways to allow GFA athletes to get into Squad and Competitive.

The board is pleased that despite the general economic malaise facing New Zealand, our membership numbers have remained remarkably solid. Feedback suggests this is down to the array of programs, how Tri Star delivers them and the ongoing enjoyment from our members. We are aware that we are competing with all manner of other activities in the market so this result is especially pleasing.

You will all be aware of significant work programs that occurred throughout the year. Some of these date back to the Auckland floods of 2023. The remediation work on our pits and the subsequent foam removal were significant programmes. From the board we wish to extend our heartfelt thanks to all the volunteers who helped out, especially putting the foam into the sleeping bags over the course of months.

Through the amazing work of Kerri, we were able to secure a number of large grants to repair the roof of the small gym, which if you have been here long enough, has been leaking for many years and the cause of many a panic. Kerri's astounding efforts in securing grants from Four Winds Foundation, NZCT and the Lotteries Commision made a significant capital item much more palatable and enabled us to service the youth of Auckland for many years to come in a safe, dry environment.

The delivery of our programs has continued to be exemplary. In Gym For All, we have consistently had record numbers in many programs over the course of the year meaning we are exceeding our members requirements. The board would also like to specifically call out Gillian's work in supporting Luke in his leadership transition as well as managing all of these programs.

2024 being an Olympic year, was a big event in the competitive space. We are pleased to report that Tri Star once again performed exceptionally well on both the national and international stage. At nationals William Fu-Allen took out top honors in the MAG senior international program, and numerous other Tri Star athletes across MAG, WAG and Tramp medalled and achieved their personal goals.

In international honours Ava Fltzgerald, Misha Koudinov, William Fu Allen, Sam Dick, Ethan Dick, Daniel Stoddart all gained selection to world cup events in February/March 2024. Following on from that Ava Fitzgerald and Ben Stein secured great results at the Pacific Rim Champs with both attaining silver medals. Georgia Rose Brown, Sam Dick, Daniel Stoddart and Ethan Dick represented New Zealand at the Oceania Champs with Ethan winning the Bronze Medal All Around. Grace Wellington had her first International Competition experience competing at World Cups in Europe. Finally Georgia-Rose Brown secured a spot at the Paris Olympics and became our highest ever standing All Around at that ultimate event.

The board would also like to take the opportunity to acknowledge some of our alumni. Gareth Brettell was a Judge at the Olympics. We are very grateful to have such outstanding resource to represent our club. We would also like to thank all the other judges - Matt, Dido, Angela, John, Peter, Poppy, Freya, Willow, Grace, Xavier, Oliver, Emily and Vicki who continue to give their time to support our sport.

To all our volunteers, thank you for your dedication and hard work. Tri Star could not achieve what we do without your continued contribution. Your willingness to pitch in and support our wonderful community makes us very grateful. We could not have done the pit re-foaming without you. As always we are very grateful to have access to a willing and able volunteer network who support the club year in and out.

As a community organisation we rely on the generosity of funding grants to make large capital investments and our thanks goes to all our supporters. NZCT, Four Winds and the Lotteries commission for their help with the new roof. Grass Roots and Foundation North for their help with new P-Bars, Trillian Trust for funding the new airtrack and TAB NZ for their help with the new spotting platforms.

The Board would also like to take this opportunity to thank our supporters and funders; Sport Auckland / Aktive, The Lion trust, Hugo Charitable Trust, NZ Community Trust, Pub Charity Limited and Friendly Manager for their continued support. We would also like to thank GNZ for their input and leadership in our sport. We would also like to thank Lennie and Associates, our Auditor for their continued engagement with Tri Star.

Thank you to my fellow Board members for their input, guidance and dedication to the club. Our success and standing in the gym sports community wouldn't be achievable without your support and input and I wanted to personally thank you for what you do for the club. It is great to welcome some new faces to the board this year.

2024 was a year of focus on strengthening our core offerings and making sure we're providing clear, quality pathways—especially helping our Gym For All athletes transition into Squad and Competitive. It's all part of building a structure that grows with our members.

Amidst all this change, one thing stayed consistent—our members' commitment. Despite the pressures of a tough economic climate, our memberships numbers were strong. We know there are a lot of other activities out there competing for families' time and attention, so we're really grateful for the continued trust in what we do at Tri Star.

On the facilities side, 2024 was busy. Some of the biggest projects were linked to the aftermath of the Auckland floods in 2023. One of the major tasks was redoing the foam pits. A job that involved months of effort and the help of many generous volunteers. A heartfelt thank you to everyone who came in to help move foam, place pieces into their covers, and support us through what was a huge piece of work.

Another long-awaited project was fixing the roof on the small gym. This had been leaking for years, but with the amazing work of Kerri and the generosity of funders like the Four Winds Foundation, NZCT and the Lotteries Commission, we were able to finally get it sorted. A dry, safe gym is a basic need, and we're thrilled that our younger gymnasts can now train in a space that doesn't involve buckets!

Our programs have gone from strength to strength this year. Gym For All participation numbers were among our best ever, which is fantastic to see. A big shoutout to Gillian for her incredible support during my first year in the GM role, as well as her leadership across our programs.

2024 included some big moments for our competitive athletes. William Fu-Allen topped the Senior MAG ranks at Nationals, while many of our gymnasts across MAG, WAG and Trampoline delivered strong performances and came home with medals and personal bests.

On the international stage, we had an impressive showing. Ava Fitzgerald, Misha Koudinov, William Fu-Allen, Sam and Ethan Dick, and Daniel Stoddart represented New Zealand at World Cup events early in the year. Ava and Ben Stein both took silver at the Pacific Rim Championships—an incredible achievement. Ethan Dick claimed an All Around bronze at the Oceania Championships, and Grace Wellington had her first taste of international competition at the European World Cups. And of course, a huge congratulations to Georgia-Rose Brown for qualifying for the Paris Olympics and earning New Zealand's best-ever All Around result at the Games. What a moment!

In 2024, Tri Star Gymnastics honoured founding member Martin Götz with a heartfelt Memorial Celebration, while some of our life members continued their annual tradition with a getaway to Miranda Hotsprings. The year also brought national recognition for Dido Götz and Angela Douglas, and international representation from judge Gareth Brettell at the Paris Olympics. Community spirit remained strong with familiar faces reconnecting at events like the AGM and Volunteers Breakfast.

Volunteers are at the heart of everything we do. Whether it was the pit re-foaming effort, helping at competitions, or just lending a hand where it's needed, we're constantly reminded how lucky we are to have such a committed and generous community.

We also couldn't do what we do without the support of our funders. Thank you to NZCT, Four Winds, Lotteries Commission, Grassroots Trust, Foundation North, Trillian Trust, and TAB NZ for helping us upgrade equipment like our P-Bars, airtrack and spotting platforms.

To our board—thank you for your guidance, encouragement and willingness to support me through this transition. And to our whole staff team thank you for making this place what it is. Your passion, care and commitment to our values show in everything you do.

I've really enjoyed my first year as GM. It's been a big year of learning, listening and laying the groundwork for the future. I'm excited about what's ahead, and I'm proud to be leading a club that means so much to so many.



The Squad program has continued to thrive in 2024, growing to over 60 athletes up there as one of the largest competitive groups. We welcomed Elena, an international exchange student, to Squad 5, and successfully ran holiday camps to maintain momentum leading into competitions. The team kicked off competition season strongly, with standout performances at the Tri Star and North Harbour competitions, including multiple 1st place individual and team finishes across various levels.

As the season progressed, athletes continued to impress at the Eastern Suburbs and Counties competitions, with several top overall and apparatus placements. The final carnival-themed home competition provided a festive finish to a fantastic season.

Squad gymnasts were also recognised at the Competitive Awards Night, celebrating their hard-earned achievements. The year concluded with strong Club Display performances, new skill development, and exciting preparations for 2025. We're incredibly proud of all the athletes and look forward to seeing them continue to grow and shine in the coming year.

Trampoline

The Tristar trampoline team had an outstanding 2024, marked by growth, strong performances, and a deepening team spirit. Term 1 began with high energy and preparation for competition season, seeing many junior athletes transition from squad into competitive pathways. The team competed successfully at events including the Icon Trampoline Champs and Tri Star T&T Champs, achieving multiple national qualifications and personal bests. A special highlight was the progress of Nikita Nicholl-Jones, who moved into the international stream before an unfortunate injury prevented her from trialling for the NZ team—nonetheless, her hard work has inspired many of her teammates.

The season culminated in a spectacular showing at Nationals, where 11 athletes represented Auckland, earning 10 medals, 17 top-8 finishes, and 7 proficiency pins —establishing Tristar as one of the top-performing age-group clubs in New Zealand. Notable victories included Ollie and Quinn as Synchro National Champions, and Ollie securing the individual trampoline title. With over 50 medals won and 14 national qualifiers across the year, the trampoline programme has truly excelled. The team continues to push forward with new skills and routine refinement as they look ahead to 2025, fuelled by a strong sense of purpose, camaraderie, and commitment to daily improvement.





Women's Artistic Gymnastics

The Women's Artistic Gymnastics program had an exciting and highly successful 2024. Senior international athletes, Ava, Grace, and Freya, all achieved major milestones, with Ava winning a silver medal on vault at the Pacific Rim Championships and Grace delivering strong performances at the World Challenge Cups in Slovenia and Bulgaria. Freya impressed with top placings at her first National Champs at the Senior International level and has been selected to represent New Zealand at the 2025 World Cups.

A major highlight of 2024 was Tri Star athlete Georgia Rose Brown competing at the 2024 Olympic Games in Paris where she achieved NZ's top AA result ever.

Our Steps athletes had a strong season as well, reaching personal bests, achieving podium finishes, and developing new skills this culminated with 21 athletes qualifying for Nationals—an outstanding achievement reflecting the dedication and perseverance across the program. We proudly farewelled Grace Wellington as she embarked on her collegiate gymnastics journey at the University of Alaska Anchorage.

Throughout the year, the gym buzzed with the celebration of new achievements, with a strong focus on continuous improvement and team spirit. As we wrap up 2024, we reflect on an incredible year of growth and success, and look forward to building on this momentum in 2025.

The Men's Artistic Gymnastics (MAG) program had an exceptional 2024, marked by strong progress across all levels and standout performances both nationally and internationally.



We welcomed many new members and coaches, filling classes from Term 1 through to Term 4, and maintaining strong enrolment momentum throughout the year. Highlights included fun and inclusive activities such as blindfold beam walks and superhero-themed preschool sessions, as well as a strong turnout for our Novice competitions, with over 200 gymnasts participating early in Term 2. The Mason Gillespie Competition provided a fantastic close to Term 3, giving gymnasts the chance to showcase their routines and gain confidence in a performance setting.

Our commitment to accessibility was reinforced through Diversability Awareness Week, with great community support helping to sustain our inclusive programming. Term 4 saw the return of our much-loved Club Display, capping off the year with a celebration of skills and progress from preschoolers to adults. Structural improvements, including a roof replacement in the small gym, ensured we're investing in a quality training environment for the future. Highlights included blindfolded beam walks during Diverse-ability Awareness Week, superhero dress-up sessions, and opportunities to explore the big gym, giving children access to new equipment and experiences that sparked enthusiasm and discovery.

As the year progressed, children in PlayGym Plus worked towards their Lemur and Monkey swing and manipulation certificates, demonstrating their growing physical literacy and bravery on the bars and rings. Term 4 saw our preschoolers end the year with energy and excitement, proudly trying new skills and gaining greater body awareness. It's been wonderful to watch them grow more confident each term.


2024 has been an outstanding year for Tri Star's DGym programme, with our biggest roll yet and growing community engagement. We've welcomed athletes from across the spectrum of abilities, offering one-on-one, semi-private, and small group classes tailored to each gymnast's needs. DGym continues to be a weekly highlight for many of our athletes, some of whom have been part of our community for over five years. We also expanded our reach through partnerships with Waikowhai Intermediate, Oaklyn Special School, and Recreate NZ, bringing inclusive gymnastics experiences to even more young people. A special thank you goes to coaches Jalaya Waleed and Amelia Alizadeh, whose dedication has enabled us to grow and meet rising demand.

The year also saw significant events that highlighted DGym's impact. Our annual DGym Week Gymathon was a great success thanks to the support of our wider community, raising funds to help us continue delivering high-quality, inclusive programming. In April, Tri Star proudly delivered the gymnastics segment of the Halberg Games, a premier event for physically disabled athletes from across the North Island. The year culminated in a memorable Gymfest, where eight DGym athletes showcased their routines to an enthusiastic audience. Their performances demonstrated not only their gymnastic skill but also their courage and joy in participating.

Birthday Parties at Tri Star have become a staple of our gymnastics delivery and allowed for a further diverse income stream.

2024 included close to 100 parties, with around 1,500 participants being introduced to our facility.

HOLIDAY PROGRAMME

Holiday Programme at Tri Star continued to be a great opportunity to continue gymnastics delivery during the school holidays as well as meeting a need of our community. Holiday programme allows us to continue to bring in income during our less busy periods as well as providing work for our school aged coaches during their holidays.

Despite the disruptions of our Pit Repairs in Term 2 holidays and the small gym re roofing in the Term 3 holidays, the holiday programme averaged close to 50 participants per day throughout the year, catering to a total of around 2,800 young people. This allowed our strong revenue performance from 2023 to continue in 2024 with over \$150,000 in revenue generated through holiday programme.



FACILITY HIRE

In 2024, Tri Star continued to support the local community by providing access to a wide range of hireable spaces, including our gymnasiums, multipurpose rooms, and conference facilities. These spaces hosted a variety of community groups and events, offering opportunities for sport, education, and performance while also generating valuable revenue that helps us keep our programmes accessible to all. Groups such as My Cheer, Shotokan Karate, Gymnastics New Zealand, Baradene School, Big Judo, Redefining Athleticism, Alpha Cheer, North Harbour Tumble, and other private hirers made use of the Keith Hay Park Gymnasium throughout the year.

Tri Star was also proud to continue its support of high-performance and representative gymnastics by offering free training access to MAG 360, the Auckland Gymnastics Team, and other performance athletes. In addition, the popular Schools Festival events, led by Dido Gotz, provided hundreds of primary and intermediate-aged children the chance to represent their schools and experience the sport of gymnastics in a fun and inclusive environment.





FACILITY DEVELOPMENT

Maintaining and upgrading a facility like the Keith Hay Park Gymnasium takes significant time, investment, and teamwork. Thanks to the dedicated efforts of our operations and finance team—Oscar Graham, Kerri Murray, and Cathy Ramanjulum—alongside the strategic guidance of our Board of Directors, Tri Star has continued to thrive in a demanding year. With over 1,500 weekly participants, expanded facility hire, and major events on the calendar, it's these consistent efforts that ensure our gym remains a vibrant hub for community sport.

This year brought several key successes, including major facility improvements and equipment upgrades. We are incredibly grateful for the generous support of funders and the wider community, which made the following achievements possible:

- \$19,000 from Four Winds Foundation towards roof replacement
- \$19,500 from NZCT for roof replacement
- \$78,162 from the Lotteries Commission for roof replacement
- \$5,000 from Grassroots Trust for new parallel bars
- \$10,000 from Foundation North for new parallel bars
- \$6,000 from TAB NZ for new spotting platforms
- \$5,000 from Trillian Trust for a new airtrack
- Completion of new small and big gym pit upgrades, including months of volunteer work to cover all the foam
- Completion of the small gym roof replacement




Fundraising and Events Coordinator: Cathy Ramanjalum

In 2024, under the financial leadership of Cathy Ramanjulum, Tri Star built on the strong foundation laid in 2023 to maintain a stable and sustainable financial position. Despite the broader economic challenges and rising operational costs, the club continued to thrive through a combination of strong membership activity, effective cost control, and diverse revenue streams. This collective effort across all areas of operation has enabled Tri Star to continue delivering quality gymnastics experiences while staying true to its mission as an accessible community sport provider.

Highlights:

- Increase of our average members per term from 1,419 in 2023 to 1,441 in 2024
- \$9,487 in fundraising revenue through DGym Week and various other fundraisers
- \$155,136 in equipment and facility development grants
- \$1,609,328 in tuition revenue (up from \$1,535,941 in 2023)
- \$36,657 revenue from Schools delivery (up from \$26,273 in 2023)
- \$17,576 interest and dividends (up from \$11,645 in 2023)
